

This garden was originally established in the 1920's by Florenz Bleeser, an active amateur botanist, who did extensive collecting of local *Eucalyptus* and in fact has a

species named for him, the endemic palm *Ptychasperma bleeseri*. Admiralty House was moved to this site in 1950 from its original Peel Street location. It is a fine example of appropriate tropical architecture in an exotic garden setting.

This is an elevated Type B (Amended) House designed by the Commonwealth Government (probably Wilfred Haslam) and constructed in 1936 on a site further down The Esplanade. It demonstrates characteristics of good tropical design drawn from buildings in SE Asia. The site was extensively modified to accommodate a restaurant that now operates on the site.

Some of the trees originally listed still exist on this block, however others have been removed over the years.
